ADIRONDACK TRAIL

From the Old Erie Canal on the Mohawk River near Fonda to historic Malone, the 188-mile Adirondack Trail presents the REAL Adirondack Adventure. The route carves its way through the foothills right into the core of the Adirondack Mountains, retracing historic trails across frontiers explored by settlers, soldiers, and early guides. The wilderness landscape is filled with wildlife as you drive or bike up to trailsheads leading to some of the best mountain peaks and canoe routes in the region.

BLUE RIDGE ROAD

The 17-mile Blue Ridge Road is low on mileage but makes up for it with lots of scenery and solitude. From North Hudson to Newcomb, the route winds through forests along the southern fringe of the Adirondack High Peaks region with few glimpses of civilization in between.

North America's first interconnecting waterway, the Upper Hudson River/Champlain Canal, Lake George, and Lake Champlain-shaped the nation-building activities of the United States and Canada. By lake, foot, boat or car, Lakes to Locks Passage provides access to over 200 miles of this historic watercourse, used by migratory birds and native peoples, explorers, armies, commercial enterprises and now, diverse recreational activities.

OLYMPIC BYWAY

The unique landscapes, lifestyles, culture, and crafts of the North Country will compete for your attention along the 170-mile Olympic Byway, stretching from the Adirondack Park to the Adirondack Park. A mix of woodlands and waterways winds through the Adirondack Park, including Lake Placid and Wilmington, sites of the 1932 and 1980 Winter Games. REVOLUTIONARY BYWAY

Running just below the southern border of the Adirondack Park, the Revolutionary Byway covers an area steeped in war history. The tour begins in Albany-New York's capital, and continues west along the Mohawk River for 158 miles to Port Ontario on Lake Ontario.

HIGH PEAKS BYWAY

Take exit 30 off the Adirondack Northway and begin your 30-mile drive on Route 73 to the Olympic Village of Lake Placid. The route climbs through narrow passes flanked by towering mountains, sparkling streams, waterfalls, and gemlike lakes. The open valley of the Ausable River provides expansive views of the surrounding High Peaks of the Adirondacks.

The Federal Highway Administration has designated specific travel corridors within the United States as either National Scenic Byways or All-American Roads. These roads are representative of a region's scenic, recreational, cultural, natural, historic or archaeological significance. www.byways.org
